President's Corner

Since I represent an organization that deals in the history of Novato, indulge me and let me reminisce about some of my personal history in Novato. I went to Novato High, married my high school sweetheart and have been married for forty-four years. For those of you who were here during those times, Novato was a very different place forty-eight years ago. Highway 101 ran right through downtown Novato with stop lights at Grant Ave. I remember sometimes on a Sunday afternoon we used to park our cars along 101, (now Redwood Blvd.), where the Viking sits and watch all the people come back from the river. Our daily hangout was the Hi Fi drive-in on First Street (where One Stop Oil Change now sits) and have a burger and coke and talk and carry on for hours with our friends.

Friday and Saturday nights we would sometimes stop at Burges Drive-In down in Ignacio. The Dollhouses,Trains and More store now sits on the property. We would get a hot deep-dish berry pie—theirs was the best. If we were out partying late at night, we would end up at the 101 Café on the corner of Grant and Highway 101 (Redwood Blvd.). West America Bank now sits on that property. I miss those days, they were simpler times. Now we have the memories of good times gone by.

Speaking of memories, we are always looking for long-time residents of Novato to reminisce about their experiences in Novato via oral histories. Our volunteers can conduct and print your stories in the Historian newsletter. If you know someone who would be able to share their memories, please give us a call or drop a line and let us know the contact information; we would greatly appreciate it.

I wish you all a prosperous year and hope to see and meet all of you at our general quarterly meetings.

• Novato was significantly left off the list of communities where Safeway Stores, Inc. has announced it intends to build supermarkets during the coming year. In December the board of Supervisors turned down, 3 - 2, a request by Safeway for more commercial zoning on its 11 acre property to allow construction of a shopping center.

• A newly incorporated firm of doctors has picked up the option to purchase almost 8 acres at the corner of Canyon and Hill Roads. The property is owned by John Novak and may be the site of a future Novato General Hospital. Newly elected officers for the corporation are Dr. Ralph Weseman, president; Dr. John C. Siemens, secretary-treasurer. The group plans to build a \$350,000 hospital with 25 to 30 beds.

• Heavy earth moving equipment was moved on the old Grant Avenue school property to start moving earth and eventually tear down the historic school structure, declared unsafe for earthquakes by the state. Once tenants can be lined up, a commercial building is to be erected on the spot.

• Miss Claudette Borloz, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rene Borloz, and Stephen A. Halbe became engaged at a recent family dinner at the Borloz home. The young couple plan a June wedding.

Novato—50 Years Ago (January, February and March 1959)

• Pioneer Park no longer is a cemetery – it is a memorial park. So said the "Memos From the City Desk" in the January 28 issue of the Advance. The same column said dirt from the Grant Avenue school site is being dumped at the Lu Sutton school grounds because of the low marshy condition of the property.

• Vernon E. Dwelly of Novato, who for 29 years has been an officer of the California Highway Patrol, was presented with CHP badge No. 1 by CHP Commissioner B.R. Caldwell in Sacramento on February 10. Dwelly was given the honor in recognition of the longest record of service of any CHP sergeant in the state of California, having served in that capacity since 1938.

• A local physician confirmed that John Novak was paid \$40,000 for the property at Canyon and Hill Roads that will become the hospital.

• Riley Wingate and D.W. Peterson, both of Atherton Avenue and well known in the Black Point area, have started a venture called "Marin Lumber." It is located at 45 Jordan Street in San Rafael. Both Riley and Dick have a thorough knowledge of lumber and building material.

• Novato's new sheriff's sub-station should go into operation the middle of March. The sub-station will be the old waiting room of the Northwestern Pacific Railway depot at the end of Grant Avenue. The substation will be manned by 4 deputies and an acting sergeant, Ed Levine, of the sheriff's office. They will be on 24-hour call.

• The county planning commission approved the tentative map of "St. Francis Heights," John Novak's subdivision in West Novato, consisting of 10,000 minimum square foot lots. The subdivision is 32 acres and is to be divided into 96 lots.

• Jack Kidder was promoted to captain by the fire commissioners on March 25. The commissioners also voted to abolish the posts of assistant fire chiefs. Robert Manzoni and Frank Manzoni are currently serving in this capacity.

• Miss Lulu Sutton, dean of Novato school teachers, suffered a mild heart attack on Feb. 14 and was hospitalized for examination and a cardiograph. She was resting in San Rafael General Hospital. Miss Sutton retired from teaching in June of 1958 after 40 years as teacher and principal in Novato schools.

• The county's new dump on the Smith Brothers. ranch north of Novato only received a "D" mark from the Bay Area Air Pollution Control District; it wouldn't receive any passing marks in any local popularity pool either.

• Almost 90 percent of residents in Loma Verde have signed petitions opposing the proposal to locate a nearby cemetery. Copies of the petitions have been sent to James Cuzner, North Marin Planning commissioner, and William Gnoss, North Marin supervisor.

• Barbara Dwelly successfully concluded an orientation class for Junior Pink Ladies of Marin General Hospital. She and four other young ladies completed training in December and are now volunteers at the hospital.

• Rayburn's celebrated the grand opening of their modern, spacious new supermarket at 850 Grant Avenue, Thursday, January 29. The market is at the foot of Sherman Avenue.

At risk for the museum is the City's support of the Guild's newsletter production currently provided by Mike Clancy at \$200 per issue and it is possible that the position of the museum curator could be eliminated. Budget information is available on the City's web site.

Hamilton Budget Meeting – The Hamilton committee met to review & revise the Hamilton Plan. The original document outlined expenditures of \$155,500 to complete the interior of the Hamilton Museum, but the group revised it downward to \$69,625. The majority of reductions came from labor saving realized by using volunteer rather than paid labor.

Curator's Report – Samantha Kimpel reported that Jim McCabe is still working at Building 500 and has begun the process of attaching digital images of the artifacts to their records in Past Perfect. She also said that the museum repair list was still pending with the City.

Hamilton Museum – Ray Dwelly reported that the phone lines should be installed in the museum today and next week PG&E should install the electrical meter. Installation of handrails might be delayed unless the City approves additional funds to cover the work.

The restroom partitions are still unresolved because to meet ADA requirements would require a stall partition to be placed over a floor drain.

Frank Paladini was born at home on the Durbrow Ranch with 84 year old Dr. Allen assisting in the delivery. He was a member of the 1940 graduating class from Novato Grammar School. • His mother speaking Italian.

• Attending Novato Grammar School and having Miss McGowan, Miss Hayes, Miss Clark, Mrs. Reese, Miss Walsh, Mrs. Busher, Mrs. Steele, and Miss Sutton as his teachers.

Novato's Treasures The Flatiron Building





Located at Scott Ct. and Grant Ave., the Flatiron building is now an upscale gift shop. The photo on the left was taken in about 1970; the one on the right in approximately 1990. It was built by Abraham Yelmorini in 1908. The Wells Fargo Express Office was housed there. Later Charles Carlisle opened a hardware store in the building. Novato's first newspaper, the Marin County Banner, also operated from this location.

• Miss Sutton was a very stern teacher. She didn't take any "guff" off anyone. She was fair and treated everyone alike. Miss Sutton was a great marble player.

• The weekend he and some friends decided to pull a prank by making an anonymous phone call to Miss Sutton's house. She had the call traced and they were reprimanded on Monday.

• Moving from the Durbrow Ranch in 1939 to property at the corner of Wilson Avenue and Vineyard Road into a house that Louis Bormolini had built for them.

• His mother died of polycystic kidney disease when he was in the eighth grade.

• Being named valedictorian of his class and graduating in the Community House in June of 1940.

• The long plays performed for graduation ceremonies including: Pinocchio, Aladdin, and Man of the Mountain.

• Selling seeds and salve door to door to earn money to buy roller skates and a bicycle.

• The Donkey Baseball games that were held in the DeBorba field, and having apple wars on haybale forts during the games.

• Catechism classes at the I.D.E.S.I. Hall.

• Attending Mass in the old church on South Novato Boulevard before it burned down and swiping apricots off the tree on the church property.

• Riding the bus to San Rafael High School each day and harassing the bus driver.

• The fish salesman from San Anselmo named Tombolini who came to the ranch once a week selling fresh fish. He had very sharp knives.

• Torassa's Bakery delivered fresh

bread all over town.

• Working on Holly Tiedeman's hay baling crew each summer.

• Seeing Roger Lane (a track legend at San Rafael High School) running up and down Wilson Avenue.

• Picking pears on the Guth Ranch and prunes on the Carrera property on Center Road.

• Cleaning chicken houses for Alex Pellegrini and hoeing weeds and clearing brush for his uncle Primo Paladini.

• Working with Pete Baccaglio at the Poultry Producers next to the railroad tracks. He volunteered to work at Poultry Producers for two weeks and stayed for 27 years.

• Novato kids made their own fun. They made sleds out of barrel staves and would sled down hills. Boys hunted birds with BB guns and swam and went trout fishing in Novato Creek. Another game that boys enjoyed was a form of baseball called "Numbers."

• Kids walked or rode their bikes to get around town. Their parents didn't drive them around.

• The 101 Highway being shut down for the Portuguese parade to pass.

• The many chicken ranches around town that were owned by the Gustafson, Cervarich, Gnoss, Sjoblom, Buhn, Lieb, Peterson, Lewis and Dep Chain families.

• Dairy ranches owned by the Corda, Grossi, Faustine and Pacheco families.

• A special family dog named "Sport" who would hunt down rabbits and bring them home.

• Picking mushrooms on the Trumbull Ranch.

• Seeing Jid Baccaglio and Walt Simonds working at Henry Hess lumber yard.

• Reno Pronzini driving his truck and Leo Pacheco driving a '37 Chevy sedan to Novato Grammar School. • Seeing Bruno Schultz waving his cane to keep Novato kids in line.

• His first car was a tan 1935 Plymouth.

• The Wulbern Turkey Farm on Vineyard Road and Robertson's Turkey Farm on Center Road.

• The Paladini family's telephone number was 950-M, and his cousin Aldo's number was 721-0. They got their first phone when they moved to the Wilson Avenue house. Kitty Chaplin was the telephone operator in town and most people were on party lines.

• The day during World War II when a plane flying out of Hamilton Field crashed into the Villadsen's chicken house on Atherton Avenue killing all the broilers.

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

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Items considered "memorabilia" are rarely accessioned into the collection. This may include items such as old issues of magazines and common household items without a story that make them unique to the Novato region or its residents.

We accept items for three distinct collections. The first is the Primary Collection. Each of these items is given an identification number (accession number) and we care for and preserve these items according to professional museum standards. These items tell a clear story about what defines and shapes the history of Novato.

The second is the Research Collection. These items are not usually given accession numbers, and this collection consists of copies of photographs, news clippings, and

The final group is the Education Collection. These items are often referred to as props. These objects don't meet the criteria for the Primary Collection, and are utilized either as props in exhibit displays or in hands-on history lessons.

These criteria can only be applied on an item-by-item basis, and I admit that they can seem vague. If you have an item that you believe should be part of the Novato History Museum, please contact me, and I will be happy to help assess its relevance to our wonderful collections.
