Eleonora Margaret Lafranchi

Eleonora Lafranchi passed away peacefully in Novato on June 23, 2012. She had

battled a stroke for the past three years and had been a patient at Country Villa on Hill Road. Eleonora died four months short of her 100th birthday. She lived in the family home, on Novato Boulevard, from birth until her stroke.

Eleonora attended Novato Grammar School and San Rafael High School, graduating from Dominican College with

a teaching degree in 1936. Her 40 years of teaching included 36 years at Coleman School in San Rafael. She was very active in civic as well as religious organizations

including the Republican Women's Club, Catholic Daughters of America, Retired

> Teachers Association and head of Our Lady of Loretto's Altar Society. Eleonora was also a charter member of the Novato Historical Guild and on the first board of directors as well as membership chair for many years. She kept membership records on card forms (before the computer era).

Eleonora is survived by her niece Shirley Glashoff and Theone Felder, wife Eleonora's late nephew, Joseph Felder. Interment was at Mt.

Olivet Cemetery in San Rafael. Memorial donations may be made to Our Lady of Loretto Catholic Church or a favorite charity.

Novato-50 Years Ago

(July, August, and September 1962)

"Novato 50 Years Ago" is a collection of items culled by Bill Almeida from the July, August and September issues of the Novato Advance newspapers in the collection of the Novato History Museum and microfilm at the Novato Library. Tonie Brown retypes the articles for the newsletter. We hope you enjoy reading the names and happenings of 1962.

- Barbara Sparrow, longtime secretary to ex-Superintendent. W.W. J. Smith, of the Novato Unified School District, followed Ralph Giovanello to the San Jose School District where she served as his personal secretary.
- Jimmy Sparks, Novato's nationally known Little League pitcher, was the guest of the San Francisco Giants at Candlestick Park in San Francisco on July 7. Jimmy visited with a few members of the Giants in their dugout before the game and chatted with announcers Russ Hodges and Lon Simmons of radio station KSFO after the game.
- Novato Savings and Loan Association opened its doors to the public on July 10, at 910 Grant Avenue. That address was temporary while the building at 1215 Grant was being remodeled as permanent headquarters. Officers, directors and stockholders of the new association numbered 54 businesses and professional men and women.
- The long-delayed application of Wells Fargo Bank to open a branch in Novato received approval from the state banking department in early July. Next step was to go to the Federal Reserve System for approval. There were unconfirmed reports that the bank might open at the Novato Fair, Safeway Shopping Center.
- Novato contractor John Novak and his wife Maria were granted an interlocutory divorce decree on July 3. The court agreed that both parties were entitled to a divorce one year from that date. Custody

of the couple's children, John, Jr., 12, and Jeffrey, 10, was awarded to Novak.

- William A. Gnoss, Jr., 23 year old son of Supervisor and Mrs. William Gnoss of Novato, left for Europe to be "on his own" for six months. Ireland, Germany and Switzerland were on his list of stops traveling by train with a special six-month ticket issued to tourists from the western hemisphere.
- A beautiful set of dentures recovered at the Ignacio sewage plant was going unclaimed. I wonder why!!
- Mr. and Mrs. Otto J. Stroeh celebrated their 35th anniversary at the Green Mill on July 21. Twelve family members attended. The Stroehs were married in Santa Barbara and have been Novato residents since 1941.
- Salary increases of approximately five percent were approved by the Novato City Council on July 31. The increases were for the Novato police officers. Mayor Babe Silva, voting against the raise, said, "I have no intention of adjusting salaries, if you know what I mean."
- Robb Shultz, 17 year old Novato High graduate, set a new Indian Valley Golf Course record when he shot a 63. Previous record was 64. Shultz shot 10 birdies with 4 coming on the last 4 holes.
- Mrs. Genevieve Jansen purchased Hiller's Shoe Store at 1411 Grant Avenue and was operating under the new name of Jansen's Shoes. Formerly Hiller's manager, Mrs. Jansen has been with the store for six years.
- The remodeling of the Central Valley Bank at 1313 Grant Avenue was slated for completion in October bank manager George Tocalino announced on August 1. The remodeling, at a cost of at least \$35,000, involved a new mezzanine floor running along the south and east walls of the building. Note: This is now Bank of

the West.

- Sharon Lee Baldwin and Edward Texeira Alfonso became engaged in early August. The marriage took place on August 18 in Reno, Nevada. Sharon graduated from Novato High School in 1960. Edward was a 1958 graduate of San Rafael High.
- Senior Master Sergeant James Collett retired from active duty with the U.S. Air Force after a 21 year career in the armed forces. Sgt. Collett and his wife, Sylvia, were Novato residents since 1947.
- Novato's three car dealers decided, jointly, in line with the rest of the county, to remain closed on Sundays.
- Police Sergeant Wayne Knutila accepted the post of Chief of Police at Gridley. He was a member of Novato's first police department in January 1960. As head of the six-man force in Gridley (Butte County), Knutila was to earn \$7,500 annually.
- Dr. Robert W. Mayo, who grew up in Novato and attended local schools, began special training in obstetrics and gynecology at Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson. He graduated from the University of California Medical School and interned at Martin Army Hospital, Fort Benning, Georgia.
- Sam Harkleroad, who had built some of the most unusual and imaginative houses in Novato, was in the process of erecting a circular house that did a 300 degree swivel. The house, located atop his own Harkle Road, is visible from Highway 101 and allows a change of view for its occupants.
- On August 21 the city council voted 3-2 to abandon the "K" route as an alternate freeway bypass. At the same time, it failed to react to the state recommendation that "J" be the future freeway route

Reports – Two new exhibits are on display at the Hamilton Field History Museum. One is the General Henry "Hap" Arnold exhibit on loan from the Sonoma Museum and the other exhibit is U-2 artifacts, courtesy of the Tom Crull family. Total sales and donations from both museums for May were \$960.40. The Guild has a total of 500 paid memberships.

July 2012

New Business – A motion was made and approved to add Jim Davenport as a new board member. Ray Dwelly got bids to have the carpets cleaned at HFHM. A motion was made and approved to go with the low bid of \$459 from Burrous Bros. that includes scotch guard at no charge. Tom Keena presented a new signup sheet that will be used at both museums for all volunteers.

City Report – Kathy Kormos suggested that the Guild go through the strategic planning process. Action Item: Prepare a Strategic Plan. The City's Policy is that no minors (under 16 years of age) can volunteer unless they are under the guidance of an adult that has had a background check. The agreement between the Guild and the City of Novato is ready for signatures.

Treasurer's Report – The City of Novato has returned \$3,000 that was a duplicate payment for the Curator from 2011.

Old Business – Hospitality still needs a chairman. Mike Silva drove his restored 1941 Cadillac in the 4th of July Parade with NHG signs on the side. The Fund Raising Committee meeting was rescheduled.

Reports – Ray Dwelly reported that three new oral interviews were done this month, and that the tiles are up on the "Patriot's Memorial Wall" at Hamilton Field History Museum. Total sales and donations from both museums for June were \$781.22.

through Novato. Note: "J" was eventually selected as the freeway route.

- Former owners of the Novato Advance were in the limelight in early September. Jack Sparrow announced he had sold his commercial printing firm to a partner, Les Barlow. James Cuzner bought the paper from Sparrow in 1952 and owned the local weekly until 1955. Cuzner and his family recently left Novato for a year's residence in Lausanne, Switzerland, where he intends to carry on his business affairs while enjoying the pleasures of Europe.
- Safeway store officially opened at the Novato Fair Shopping Center on September 12. Mrs. W.O. Bird of 1667 Hill Road had the distinction of being the first customer when the doors opened at 9 a.m. Present at the ribbon-cutting ceremony were Mayor and Mrs. Babe Silva, Supervisor and Mrs. William Gnoss, William Berry, president of the Novato Chamber of Commerce, city administra-

tor John Baget, and numerous other dignitaries.

- David P. Jones, 27, joined the law firm of Robert D. Carrow in September, as an associate. Jones passed the state bar examination in March. He participated in the "legislative internship program" in Sacramento prior to joining Carrow.
- Dr. and Mrs. Ralph J. Weseman departed Novato in late September for northeastern Mexico, where he was to head a Seventh Day Adventist sanitarium and hospital. Dr. Weseman was replacing Dr. Gordon Hackett, who was returning to Loma Linda University in southern California for further medical training.
- John Baget, city administrator, faithfully attended a meeting of the parks and recreation commission on July 19 despite the fact it was his wedding anniversary.
- The Novato school board moved to buy a parcel of South Novato Boulevard fronting Rancho School before the prop-

erty was used for commercial use. An area of 1.6 acres, immediately south of the Nave Shopping Center was involved. The property was owned by Richard Connell.

- The Advance issue of 8/15/62 stated an advantage of living in Novato "where we have a choice of eight television channels -2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 9, 10 and 13 if your home is located in the right area."
- Novato resident and California Highway Patrolman Sam Thomas was recovering from an injury when a car at a street light backed up on him while he was sitting on his motorcycle. Sam had to wear a neck brace for the injury which occurred in June.

Street is now, and selling them to motorists driving by.

- Graduating from the eighth grade at Marion School in 1957 in an outdoor ceremony on the school grounds where graduates wore cap and gown.
- Riding tricycles with Martin up to Grandma Baccaglio's house on the ranch.
- Going with Uncle Pete to the cow pastures where the Lynwood homes are now located to pick mushrooms.
- Visiting Mrs. Nave in her old house across Novato Boulevard with Martin where she would let us reach into her cookie jar and take one.
- Riding bikes on Novato Boulevard and not seeing many cars driving by.
- She and Martin started packing eggs as they came off the egg washing machine when they were about five years old. As they packed, their father, Frank, drilled them in math. It took about two hours each day to clean and pack the eggs. (Needless to say, they were both excellent in math.) They helped with many other chores on the ranch: collecting eggs, moving chickens, and vaccinating chickens as well as chores with the other animals and with the walnut orchard. They were paid for their work. It was their spending money as they got older; but they had to save some of their pay. They learned the value of work and

- Having several pigs on the ranch. It was always fun when the baby pigs arrived. Sometimes they would bottle feed the "runt" of the litter.
- Shopping at Rayburns, Ashermans, Food Fair, Brewer's Dry Goods (she bought the fabric for her first 4-H sewing project there), the Five and Dime Store, and Dean's Rexall Drug Store across from the Catholic Church.
- Going to Dr. Weseman when sick, and to Dr. George Lane, our dentist, in Petaluma.
- Attending Mass every Sunday at Our Lady of Loretto in the old church on Grant Avenue, and then to the new church on Novato Boulevard.
- Receiving first communion and making her confirmation in the old church.
- Attending catechism classes every Saturday morning and then walking to the Novato Theater for the Kids' Show, which would cost 25 cents admission.
- Going to the Post Office on Grant Avenue and getting mail from Box L-2; then home delivery started to deliver mail to our box on the street.
- Our first telephone was a wooden wall phone in the back porch of the old Baccaglio home and we had our special ring. We then got a black table phone. The Baccaglio phone number was 911-Y.

- Being a 4-H club member for ten years. Her main projects were dairy and sewing, and they are still her main interests today. George Orr was her dairy leader, and Mrs. Pearl Lieb taught her sewing. Other dedicated 4-H leaders were Joe Wright, Reno Pronzini, Frank Smaw, and Sam and Josephine Marzell.
- Attending Los Posados 4-H Camp in Napa County each summer and enjoying swimming, hiking, snipe hunts, crafts

- She loved going to the fairs and showing her dairy, sheep and pigs at the Cow Palace, Sonoma-Marin, Sonoma County and the California State Fair.
- Winning the Directors' Cup as the outstanding 4-H club exhibitor at the Sonoma-Marin Fair.
- Attending Regional 4-H Conferences and the State Convention at U.C. Davis and meeting 4-H'ers from all over the state.
- Being named Marin County 4-H All Star in 1962.
- Meeting her husband, George Nunes, while both were members of the Novato Aggie 4-H Club and had dairy projects. (They recently retired after 45 years in the dairy business.)
- During high school, she was chosen Macy's "Teen High School Representative" from Novato and worked there part time. While in college, she worked for P.G.&E. in San Francisco. The rest of her working career were the 45 years she and George had their Holstein dairy ranch.
- Novato had numerous small shops and most of the store owners knew her family or the Baccaglio name. There was still a blacksmith shop and it didn't take long to walk from one end of town to the other.
- Watching the annual Portuguese parade from the second story window of the old Silva house on Grant Avenue and marching in one parade with cousins Mike and Frank Silva. She always wished she could be Queen, but being Italian, that wasn't possible. Years later, her daughter, Noel Nunes, was Queen in the Novato parade celebration.
- Western Weekend was a big deal during her teenage years. There was a great parade, the Buckaroo Breakfast, and a rodeo at the Novato Horsemens' Grounds. The whole town celebrated Western

Weekend.

- Enjoying "baby chick time" each February when the new crop of about a thousand baby chicks arrived. Of course this meant extra chores in the brooder house.
- Attending the Firemens' Picnic on the Corda Ranch.
- The day Mr. Nave gave Martin and her a big juke box.
- Going to the Hi-Fi Drive In, where we could buy a hamburger, french fries and a coke for 44 cents.

- Our class was the first to attend the new campus of Novato High School all four years.
- The N.H.S. football teams were very good, but the basketball teams were terrible.
- Being a N.H.S. cheerleader, and attending all sports events.
- Serving on the student council and being on many school committees for dances, special events, etc.

Novato's Treasures BLACK POINT RAILROAD DRAWBRIDGE



ca. approximate 1888

December 16, 1887 - Chief Engineer Dolson, with a large force of men, is now engaged at the mouth of the Petaluma creek in swinging the four immense cylinders which are to encase the concrete for the foundation of the large draw-bridge for Donahue Railroad extension in Sonoma valley. The draw-bridge is to be of the most improved modern construction, and will be built entirely of steel and iron, and is to cost \$75,000. The roadbed from Pacheco (Ignacio) to Sears Point is graded almost its entire length. The road will be completed inside of ninety days.

May 27, 1888 – The largest drawbridge in the United States has just been completed for the San Francisco and North Pacific

Railroad, across Petaluma creek. The bridge is 3,100 feet in length, the draw being 226 feet long and the base 10 feet above the water line. The draw weights, 125 tons, can support a load of 290 tons and rest on piles encased in iron. It is intended in the near future to discontinue the ferry service to Donahue landing, and to have all passengers for the Sonoma Valley road go over on the Tiburon boats.

The Federal Railroad Administration shut down the rail line in 1998. The North Coast Railroad Authority has spent more than \$60 million since 2007 fixing unsafe bridges, crossings signals and tracks. It reopened in July 2011.
